AWARDS

The Morselli Medal is awarded every two years by the International Academy for Suicide Research (IASR) to an individual who has made an outstanding and important lifetime contribution to the study of suicidal behaviour and/or suicide prevention. This is the Academy's most distinguished award and is intended to be a "lifetime achievement" award. The Award is named in honour of Enrico Morselli, late of the University of Genoa School of Medicine who is regarded as being the first scientific, statistically informed epidemiologist in suicidology.


2019 Winners of the Morselli Medal



Yeates Conwell, M.D. University of Rochester School of Medicine and Dentistry, USA

Yeates Conwell, M.D. is Professor of and Vice Chair of Psychiatry, University of Rochester School of Medicine and Dentistry, where he is Director of the UR Medical Center's Office for Aging Research and Health Services and Co-Director of the UR Center for the Study and Prevention of Suicide. Immediate Past President and Chair of the Scientific Council of the American Foundation for Suicide Prevention, Dr. Conwell received

his medical training at the University of Cincinnati and completed his Psychiatry Residency and a Fellowship in Geriatric Psychiatry at Yale University School of Medicine. In addition to teaching, clinical care, and service system development, Dr. Conwell directs an inter-disciplinary program of research in aging, mental health services, and suicide prevention.



Robert Goldney, M.D. University of Adelaide, Australia

Bob Goldney qualified in medicine in Adelaide in 1967 and as a psychiatrist in 1973. He is a Fellow of the Royal Australian and New Zealand College of Psychiatrists, and of the Royal College of Psychiatrists of the United Kingdom. He worked in academic settings at the University of Adelaide and Flinders University in the 1970s and early 80s, completing his MD in 1979, which examined attempted suicide in young women. Following this, for about 15 years he worked in private

practice until he took on a half time Professorial position in 1996, based at The Adelaide Clinic. Then in 2007 he was appointed Head of the Discipline of Psychiatry of the University of Adelaide and he moved to the Royal Adelaide Hospital. He retired in 2009 and is now Emeritus Professor. His main research interest has been in the prevention of suicidal behaviour by focussing on the detection and optimum clinical management of psychiatric illness, particularly

depression. He also has a long standing interest in historical aspects of psychiatry. He is a recipient of the Stengel Research Award (1987) of the International Association for Suicide Prevention; the Senior Research Award (1992) of the Royal Australian and New Zealand College of Psychiatrists; the Dublin Award of the American Association for Suicidology (2007) for lifetime achievement in suicide research; and the Lifetime Research Award of Suicide Prevention Australia in 2009. His work has resulted in over 400 publications, and in 2014 the 2nd Edition of his book 'Suicide Prevention' was shortlisted in the British Medical Association's best psychiatric book award. A 3rd Edition with Nav Kapur was published in 2019. He is a Past President of both the International Association for Suicide Prevention, and the International Academy for Suicide Research. In 2013 he was honoured as an Officer in the General Division of the Order of Australia "For distinguished service to medicine in the field of psychiatry, as a researcher and academic, through international contributions to the study of suicide and its prevention."

IASR MEMBERSHIP INFORMATION

There are three categories of IASR members: Junior members, Regular members and Fellows of the Academy.

Junior members are individuals engaged in suicide research under the direction of a mentor. Examples are postdoctoral trainees, doctoral or masters students. The duration of a junior membership is limited to 3 years at the end of which they will automatically be considered for regular membership.

Junior members:

pay no dues are invited to the meeting receive the IASR newsletter are eligible for IASR Star Awards

Regular members are individuals who are engaged in ongoing research on suicide, either directly or as advisers, reviewers or consultants in an academic institution or equivalent.

Regular membership dues: 1 year: \$150 USD 3 years: \$400 USD (12% reduction)

Regular members:

receive a print copy of the journal have access the electronic version of the journal at no charge

Fellows of the Academy are individuals who have established a reputation as significant contributors to knowledge in the field of suicidal behavior. This is exemplified by directing and designing innovative research, making significant contributions to the peer reviewed literature and providing guidance to trainees and developing scientists. Fellows are appointed from among existing regular members or de novo from the scientific community.

Criteria for membership in the Academy:

The person should be an outstanding and internationally recognized researcher in the field of suicidology as indicated by publications in peer review journals.

- The research need not necessarily be empirical research, but can include theoretical, ethical or legal research work.
- Should be highly recommended by peers.
- No history of scientific misconduct.

EARLY CAREER RESEARCHER FORUM

The International Academy of Suicide Research (IASR) and the American Foundation for Suicide Prevention (AFSP) are committed to fostering the development of Early Career Researchers (ECRs), such as graduate students, postdoctoral fellows, residents, and junior faculty, within the field of suicidology, and are planning an exciting and valuable program for ECRs at the upcoming 2019 International Summit on Suicide Research in Miami Beach, on October 27-30. The ECR forum was one of the most talked about aspects of the 2017 program and we are excited to offer it again to those who wish to participate!

Inaugurated at the 2013 IASR meeting, the forum pairs ECRs with established senior investigators based upon their shared research interests. This year, each ECR will be matched in advance with a specific mentor and will then be able to meet with them later in the conference. Mentors and mentees will meet at a special breakfast at 7am on Monday October 28, at which **Nav Kapur MBChB, MMedSc, FRCPsych, MD (University of Manchester)** will be giving the ECR keynote talk and passing on his invaluable advice for those starting out in the field of suicidology. As well as our special guest speaker, we have also organized a "suicide research-a-thon", an exciting activity based around the "hackathon" concept. During this event, ECRs will have the opportunity to meet a variety of senior researchers and fellow ECRs and interact together in a brief group activity, where they will collaboratively explore ways to address a key challenge in the field.

ECR Keynote Speaker:



Nav Kapur, FRCPsych, M.D. University of Manchester

Nav is Professor of Psychiatry and Population Health at the University of Manchester, UK, and an Honorary Consultant Psychiatrist at Greater Manchester Mental Health NHS Foundation Trust. He is Head of Research at the Centre for Suicide Prevention in the University of Manchester and leads the suicide work programme of the National Confidential Inquiry into Suicide and Homicide which collects data on

all suicide deaths among people in contact with health services in the UK. He was Chair of the Guideline Development Group for the National Institute for Health and Clinical Excellence (NICE) self-harm guidelines (longer term management) and also chaired the Quality Standards for self-harm. He is currently chairing the NICE guidelines for depression in adults and is topic expert on the NICE guidelines for suicide prevention in the community. He is a member of the Department of Health's (England) National Suicide Prevention Strategy Advisory Group. He has published extensively on suicide and self-harm with much of his research focussing on how health services might best contribute to suicide prevention.
