Alcohol, Clinical and Experimental Research was founded by the National Council on Alcoholism (now the NCADD). Alcohol use disorder cause significant social and medical harm, and research into the etiology and consequences of alcohol use is essential to guide prevention, treatment and policy. Alcohol, Clinical and Experimental Research gives readers direct access to the most significant and current research findings on the nature and management of alcohol use disorder and alcohol-related disorders. Each month this journal brings basic science researchers and health care professionals the latest clinical studies and research findings related to alcohol, alcohol use disorder, as well as alcohol-related disorders and organ damage. The journal includes categories of basic science, clinical research, and treatment methods.

Aims

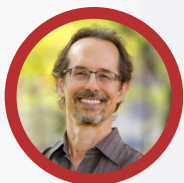

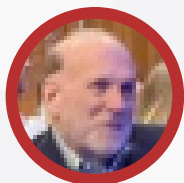

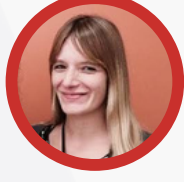

Committees

ADVOCACY COMMITTEE

has the primary responsibility for communicating with the consulting agency hired by RSA (DLA Piper) to promote Congressional support for alcohol research. The committee will be responsible for directing and evaluating the lobbying efforts and reporting to the Society regarding the effectiveness of this effort. In conjunction with lobbying activities, Hill Day, Advocacy Webinars, the committee members may be asked to provide testimony to Congress or other agencies (e.g., Department of Defense); to facilitate meetings of RSA members with their Congressional representatives; to provide appropriate language regarding alcohol research for inclusion in Congressional and other reports; and to inform Society members of opportunities to write to their Congressional representatives in support of funding for alcohol research.

ANIMAL RESEARCH AND ETHICS COMMITTEE (AREC)

is charged with reviewing, disseminating and discussing topics related to the ethical use of animals in biomedical research and increasing awareness among the RSA Membership of the growing number of challenges that are being directed at investigators who study alcohol use and other addictive disorders. This committee accepts nominations yearly for the AREC Award. Applications are reviewed and selected by the committee. The awardee is presented with a plaque at the closing ceremony.

AWARDS COMMITTEE

is charged with reviewing nominations for and selecting the recipients of the Distinguished Researcher Award; the Early Career Investigator Award; the Lifetime Achievement Award; the Henri Begleiter Excellence in Research Award; the Marlatt Mentorship Award; and the Dora Goldstein Distinguished in the Sciences Award based on a rating system that is designed and agreed upon by the committee. Requests for nominations are sent to membership via email marketing sent out by the Member Services Manager in October. Additionally, the committee is charged with selecting the Memorial Awardees from the oral presentation speakers (1 student and 1 post-doc when applicable), when funds are available; these awards honor recently deceased members. Note: The Board of Directors selects the recipients of the Sexias Award, and the Public Outreach Committee selects the recipient of the Media Award.

CAREER DEVELOPMENT AND TRAINING COMMITTEE

is responsible for addressing professional development needs of RSA Members at all stages of their careers, with a particular focus on mentoring, networking, scientific presentation and grantsmanship. The committee members will coordinate professional development activities at the annual meeting, including workshops. Promote networking among junior members with student- and postdoc-specific events and through the meeting mentor program. Facilitate interactions between NIAAA staff with extramural trainees and faculty through events and workshops. Manage the Enoch Gordis Award competition for excellence in scientific presentations by students and postdoctoral fellows.

Committees

COMMUNICATION AND PUBLICATIONS COMMITTEE

is responsible for negotiating and overseeing financial arrangements with the official RSA journal, Alcohol, Clinical and Experimental Research (i.e., negotiation of publication contract, annual review of the Editorial Office budget). The committee Chair appoints a Social Media Editor for RSA who works in collaboration with RSA Member Services Manager to create RSA branded content for posting on the Society platforms. The Social Media Editor is the chair of the Social Media Workgroup.

CONTINUING EDUCATION COMMITTEE (CEC)

is responsible for the development, implementation, and management of the Research Society on Alcohol (RSA) program in continuing education. Their mission is to provide medical professionals, psychologists, social workers, and other health practitioners with high-quality, evidence-based information on alcohol use and alcohol use disorders. Leveraging the expertise of RSA's scientific community, the CEC provides both in-person and online training opportunities designed to support clinical practice and professional development. The CEC is responsible for evaluating and approving new CEU/CME content proposals, ensuring the currency and accuracy of educational materials, and developing new programs to meet the emerging needs in the field. The CEC will interface with other relevant committees within RSA as part of the Society's broader efforts in education, training, and community outreach.

LIVING OUR VALUES COMMITTEE (LOV)

has three primary aims: (1) to expand RSA Membership and create a welcoming environment where every member is valued and supported; (2) to strengthen the scientific program by encouraging research that reflects the full spectrum of human populations and experiences; (3) to champion professional development and opportunity for members across the full range of backgrounds and identities, including sex, age, ethnicity, race, gender identity, sexual orientation, religion, nationality, socioeconomic status, and physical or cognitive ability.

MEMBERSHIP COMMITTEE

is responsible for attracting and retaining a new generation of scientists to the Research Society on Alcohol, as well as in the field of alcohol research. The primary role of the members is to actively seek to recruit new members into RSA through various outreach activities including providing membership recruitment driven content for mass/listserv email, by word of mouth, sharing flyers, any outside meetings, and through colleague contacts etc. The Membership Committee members shall solicit help from current RSA Members to help attract new members into the RSA.

PARTNERSHIPS AND DEVELOPMENT COMMITTEE

has three major missions: (1) to formulate new initiatives for RSA involvement that are consistent with the society's mission; (2) to fund and administer the Doctoral Student Small Grants Program (DSSGP) to provide pilot support of novel research by young investigators; and (3) to formulate and pursue strategies to raise funds to support the RSA initiatives.

Committees

PUBLIC OUTREACH COMMITTEE

is responsible for developing and disseminating information for informing health professionals, members of the public, and fellow scientists about the value and impact of alcohol research. The target audience will understand, through our efforts, how our leading-edge research is helping find solutions to the problems raised by alcohol overuse. Types of actions that our members may undertake include (a) designing lectures and other educational activities targeting our constituent groups, (b) meeting with members of local organizations to the current year Annual Meeting to invite them to participate and stress the importance of research to address individual and societal problems associated with alcohol consumption, (c) review the nominations for the RSA Media Award and select the awardee. This award honors journalists and writers who are effective, through their work, in communicating the importance of alcohol use and its disorders and the need to research its causes, prevention, and treatment, and (d) any other activities that foster the primary goals of educating the public.

PROGRAM COMMITTEE

consists of at least 20 RSA Members that review submission content alongside the Program Committee co-chairs, Vice President, Content Manager. The RSA President and Association Manager must work very closely with all parties and communicate on all aspects of the meeting. It is important that the Program Committee Co-Chairs have a good working relationship and are in frequent contact concerning the scientific quality and scheduling of the program. The Program Committee Co-Chairs will submit to the President for approval a list of at least 20 members to serve on the Program Committee. Past chairs of the Program Committee may serve as members of the current committee to provide further continuity. The Program Committee shall meet and/or communicate by e-mail and/or virtual meetings throughout the year preceding the Annual Meeting to formulate general policy.

COMMITTEE WORKGROUPS

SOCIAL MEDIA WORKGROUP (COMMUNICATIONS & PUBLICATIONS)

is made up of one liaison from each of the committees listed above. The members of this workgroup will meet as needed (after the first introductory meeting each year) to discuss any important issues pertaining to the content creation for posts on social media platforms. All content that is to be posted is done so in collaboration with the Social Media Editor. The RSA Member Services Manager will then post the content using Marketing images that follow RSA branding.

LOCAL ORGANIZING WORKGROUP (PUBLIC OUTREACH)

consists of RSA Members that are local to or live around the meeting venue; these members help suggest local establishments for the meeting to highlight such as: information on local volunteering, tourist activities, restaurants, and shopping areas.

ALCOHOL GUIDELINES STUDY GROUP

RSA is establishing an Alcohol Guidelines Study Group to foster scientific discussion and inform evidence-based perspectives on alcohol consumption guidelines. Additional details will be announced soon.

RSA Advocacy

The mission of the Advocacy Committee is to advance, through public policy, federal agency action, and Congressional outreach, the interests of the Research Society on Alcohol (RSA) and its members in promoting the acquisition, dissemination, and application of scientific knowledge on alcohol's effects on physical and mental health across the lifespan and their impact on public health and safety. The Committee has primary responsibility for coordinating with RSA's consulting agency, DLA Piper, to promote Congressional support for alcohol research, as well as directing and evaluating lobbying efforts and reporting to the Society on their effectiveness. In conjunction with these activities, including Hill Day and Advocacy Webinars, the Committee may provide testimony to Congress and federal agencies, facilitate meetings between RSA members and Congressional representatives, contribute language for legislative and agency reports, and inform and engage Society members in advocacy opportunities. The Committee also educates RSA Members on public policy issues and legislative and regulatory initiatives that affect their work, encouraging active participation in advancing these shared interests.

The Annual Meeting features a wide-ranging and engaging format, including plenary presentations, symposia, roundtables, workshops, and poster sessions. Poster sessions are structured to allow ample time each day for attendees to walk through and fully engage with the research being presented—making them an especially valuable and accessible entry point for new members and trainees. These sessions provide a welcoming environment to present research, exchange ideas, receive feedback, and become actively involved in the RSA community.

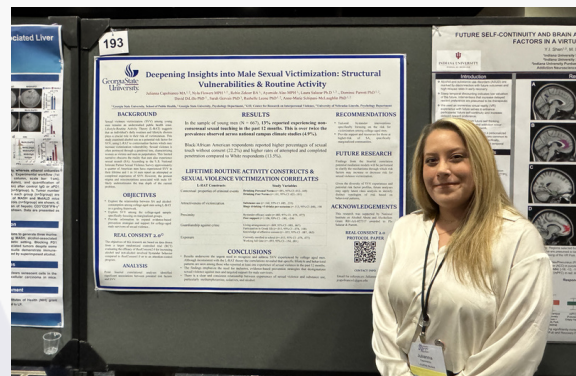
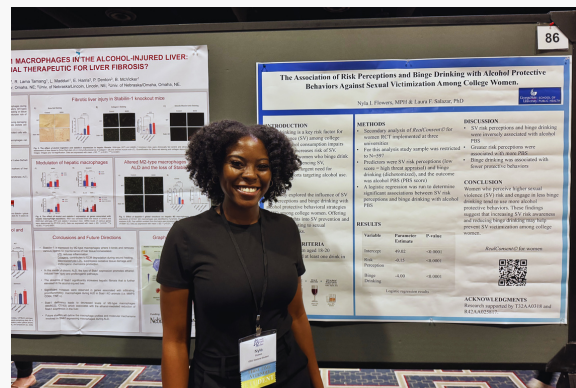
